LOCATION

Figuig, Marocco

The Figuig oasis, renowned for its historical and cultural heritage linked to traditional water management, is now threatened by the increasing scarcity of this resource and growing climate change impacts. Traditional water management practices, although precious, **are exclusively controlled by men**, while women **are allowed to use** the spring water for domestic and agricultural tasks, with no decision-making rights over water governance and management.

The **Women and Sustainable Cities programme in Figuig** highlights the specific challenges that women face in water management. It identifies priorities and proposes concrete solutions to improve resilience and strengthen the inclusion of women in water management and governance.



PROJECT METHODOLOGY

Participatory assessment of women's vulnerabilities to water scarcity and their level of involvement in local governance of water resources.

Empowering women in sustainable water management through training in sustainable water management and pilot projects co-created and co-delivered with civil society and the Municipality.

Strengthening municipal knowledge and capacity on gender-sensitive urban planning for council members and local authority officials.

Regional exchange between participating cities in Morocco, Tunisia, and Mauritania to strengthen a collective understanding of effective strategies and good practice for managing and adapting to the impacts of climate change.

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CITIZEN ENGAGEMENT TO IMPROVE WOMEN'S INVOLVEMENT IN WATER GOVERNANCE



MORE THAN 230 CITIZENS were mobilized during the participatory evaluation phase through citizen surveys, workshops, and community mapping to identify the risks and challenges associated with water scarcity. **70% of whom were women**



AROUND 60 WOMEN took part in training sessions covering a range of topics, notably sustainable water consumption, national and international water legislation and its impact on women at the local level, and transformative leadership for women in Figuig.



30 YOUNG PEOPLE FROM FIGUIG took part in activities to raise awareness of climate impacts and water-related risks and took part in a short film competition on these subjects.



MORE THAN 50 CITIZENS took part in identifying pilot projects to support the role of women in water management and access.

Political leadership programme for dedicated women of Figuig to improve their integration into water governance bodies and increase their participation in water decision-making




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

SCALING UP THE FIGUIG INITIATIVES: HERITAGE, CLIMATE, AND INCLUSIVE SPACES IN MOROCCAN MEDINAS



CONTEXT

Moroccan cities are growing rapidly, creating major challenges for **economic development**, **social inclusion**, **and environmental sustainability**, particularly in the historic medinas of the country. Women face **restrictions on access to economic and political opportunities**. Their aspirations are often held back by deeply rooted social norms. Their access to public spaces is complicated by poorly maintained streets, inadequate lighting, high levels of insecurity and the growing urban heat.

Faced with these challenges, the **initiative focuses on promoting medinas by integrating a gender approach to improve the management of public spaces**. It also relies on **heritage-based climate adaptation solutions** to make these medinas more resilient to climate change while preserving their rich cultural heritage.



HERITAGE-BASED CLIMATE SOLUTIONS AND ENHANCEMENT

A PARTICIPATORY APPROACH FOR INCLUSIVE PUBLIC SPACES THAT ARE RESILIENT TO CLIMATE CHANGE



PARTICIPATORY URBAN PLANNING:

- Integrate gender equity priorities into city policies and planning processes, understanding the causes of women's exclusion through participatory tools for engaging women and the broader public.
- Involve local authorities and citizens in the evaluation and co-creation of urban plans, while promoting dialogue with women and their representatives.



CONCRETE INCLUSIVE SPATIAL INTERVENTIONS:

- Carry out spatial interventions designed with and for women, aimed at promoting their economic autonomy, social inclusion, climate adaptation capacity, and safety in the medinas.
- Implement these interventions through a gender-sensitive procurement process in collaboration with the municipality, civil society, and women's associations.



CAPACITY BUILDING AND UPSCALING:

- Support the understanding of participatory urban planning approaches by local authorities and facilitate the dissemination of the results of the initiative.
- Promote the transfer of successful experiences between participating towns and other towns in the region, with a view to scaling them up regionally and nationally.
