	Gender equality is essential, whether viewed as a matter of justice, democracy or inclusion. In many parts of the world, governments and political parties have taken important steps to ensure a more balanced participation of women and men in political life at all levels, but the picture remains very patchy. Moreover, public policies – international, national and local – need to have a strong gender focus if a good level of social and economic development is to be achieved. This session looks at how we can strengthen the role and place of women as true and equal partners in governance at all levels.
